# **ECONOMY STRUCTURE**

The Central African Republic (CAR) is recovering from a period of social and political unrest. Reinstatement of economic activity is a slow process in spite of the post-conflict agreement and presidential elections in 2005. The economy is dominated by the agricultural sector and diamond mining (38% of exports).

The European Union is the most important donor with an allowance of MEUR 85.8 based on the 9<sup>th</sup> EDF. This aid is mainly focused on the development of infrastructures, especially transport, in order to open up the country. IMF granted a post conflict aid amounting to EUR 10 million in 2005.

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#### Sectorial distribution:

- Primary industry (53.8% of GDP): coffee, cotton, sugar, cassava, foxtail, sesame, rice, sorghum, breeding, wood
- Manufacturing industry (21,4% of GDP): mines (gold, diamond), agro-food, tobacco, aluminium,
   Construction & Civil Engineering
- Service industry (24,8% of GDP): transport, telecommunications, trade, banking

#### **CONSTRUCTION & CIVIL ENGINEERING SECTOR**

The Construction and public works sector grew in 2005 after two years of stagnation. Supported by the revival of external funding and by some infrastructure works, SMEs took advantage of this to develop their business. However, the State has not sufficient funds, to carry out the necessary major infrastructure projects and the support of the international donor community in this field is still low for the moment. The main projects refer to the development of road infrastructures in order to open up the country whose access to the seaside is possible only through two ways: the road, via the Trans-Cameroonian from Bangui to Douala (1500 km), and the river-borne transport, to reach the Republic of Congo.

#### **PLAYERS**

Local conflicts over the past years having led to the suspension of international aid, the European companies were less present due to the lack of important projects. Few of them have subsidiaries in the CAR. The local pattern mainly consists of SMEs and informal contractors. There is only one professional organisation in Construction & Civil Engineering represented by the Construction and Public Works National Trade Union.

# **INFRASTRUCTURES**

- Roads: 23.810 km, of which only 458 km are asphalt coated. The country counts approximately 5.000 km of regional roads and 4.000 km of national roads. EU has programmed funding for a rehabilitation project by asphalting the Bouar-Garoua Boulaï (150 km) road segment in view of improving access to Cameroon (MEUR 55). EU has also earmarked an allowance of MEUR 6.5 for road rehabilitation in Bangui. Japanese cooperation is also present in this sub-sector.
- Airports: there is an international airport (Bangui) and 40 internal aerodromes out of which only 3 are asphalt coated.
- Waterways: 2.800 km of waterways on the Oubangui, Sangha and M'Poko rivers. These waterways
  allow transport of logs and cotton as well as exchange of food products with neighbour countries. A
  rehabilitation project for the harbour installations and a modernisation project of the fleet operated by
  SOCATRAF (Société Centrafricaine de Transport Fluvial) are to be implemented (EU MEUR 4.5).
- Water: only 20% of houses have access to drinking water in urban areas and 35% in rural areas, despite the CAR's fluvial resources. The urban distribution network is obsolete and about one thousand water sources in rural areas have been damaged during successive conflicts. Water distribution is provided by Sodeca whose financial status is quite alarming and which should be subject to privatisation.
- Energy: only 3% of the population has access to electricity. The public company Energie de Centrafrique (Enerca) ensures the production, transport and distribution of electricity. Production is mainly implemented by the two hydroelectric units with a capacity of 18.75 MW. Equipment is obsolete and causes frequent load shedding. In the rural areas, secondary centres are powered by diesel thermal groups.

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## **HOUSING AND FUNCTIONAL BUILDINGS**

- Housing: in spite of the increase of urban population, housing construction programmes are rare.
   Dwelling constructions are frequently precarious, built in semi-hard, in a non-formal urban environment lacking basic infrastructures. Some rehabilitation projects for certain areas of the capital have received support from AFD (Thimo III).
- Functional buildings: the rare major construction work projects have been executed through
  grants such as the stadium of 20,000 places financed by China. Rehabilitation and development
  needs for sanitary and educational infrastructures are very high, but are hindered by the lack of
  budgetary resources.

## **BUILDING MATERIALS**

- **Cement:** all cement is imported, mainly from Cameroon. Average annual consumption amounts to 25,000 T. However, China has provided funds for carrying out a feasibility study for a cement plant.
- Other building materials: the country's potential is not fully used. CAR depends on the imports of building materials, but the country's land-locked situation triggers costs higher than those of bordering countries.
